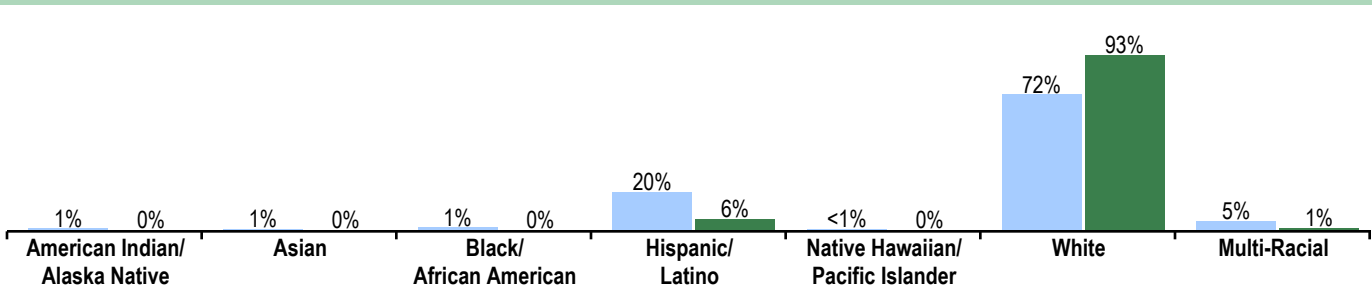

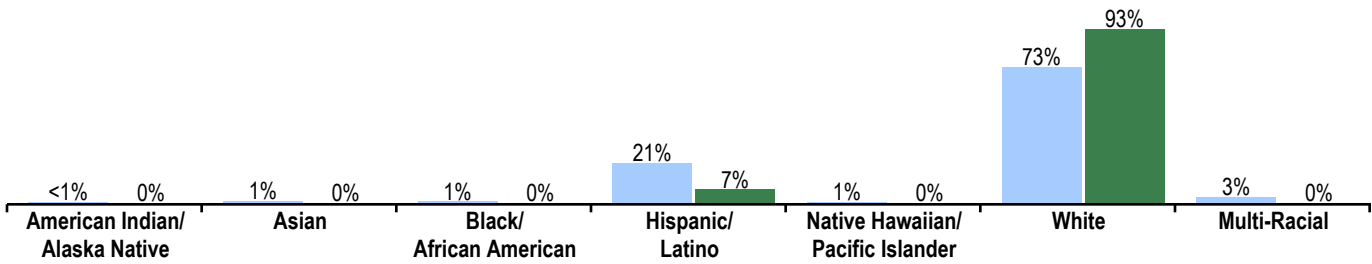
RACE/ETHNICITY OF STUDENTS AND STAFF 2016-17

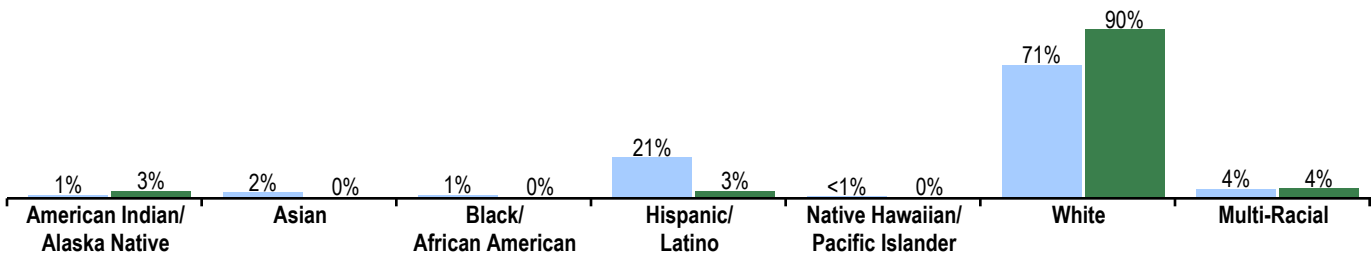

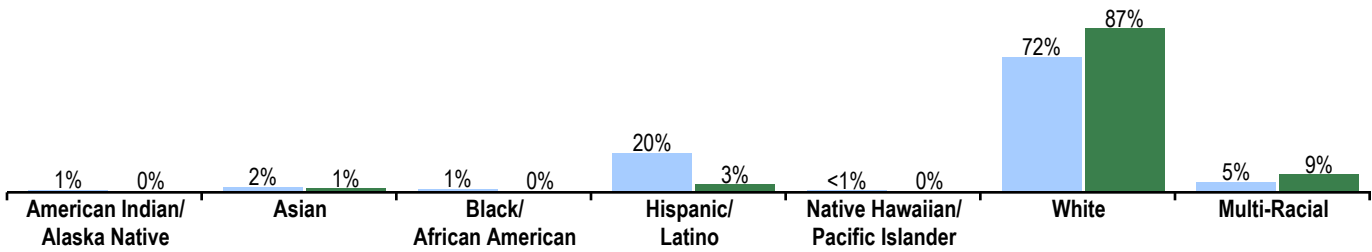
Grades 4-5
