Schools are rated in three areas.

Student Performance Rating is determined by results of the Oregon State Assessment Tests given in spring 2001 in mathematics, reading and writing. A school's improvement over time is also factored in this rating.

Student Behavior Rating is determined by the attendance and dropout rates for the 2000-01 school year. A school's improvement over time is also factored in this rating.

School Characteristics Rating is determined by the number of students participating in state testing.

Overall Rating is a combined score of student performance, student behavior, school characteristics and improvement over time.


Great things are happening in Newberg classrooms!

20 Year Trend





Safety and Growth Challenge Facilities

Imagine four and a half Newberg Fred Meyer stores and you have an idea of the amount of building space the school district manages in ten different locations. Safety, building repairs and accommodating growth continue to challenge schools.

Two years ago, a citizen-lead Facilities Committee recommended extensive repairs and new school buildings to accommodate current and future enrollment. The district is carefully reviewing recommendations to ensure safe school buildings that serve students now and in the future.

Did You Know?

- 1. Safety corrections are needed at all schools.
- 12 separate buildings at NHS pose safety/security risk
- water and sewer systems at Ewing Young are inadequate
- all school sites lack exterior intercoms and need security upgrades
- Dundee bus drop off is inadequate
- ADA handicap access needed at most sites

2. Buildings need repairs

- heating and ventilation systems at Mabel Rush need replacement
- all school sites need energy efficiency upgrades
- Mabel Rush and Ewing Young need renovations to upgrade program spaces
- Re-roofing, window replacement needed for energy efficiency

3. Newberg High and elementary schools are overcowded.

- NHS currently uses 15 portable classrooms to serve 1500 students on a campus built for 950 students
- Space at NHS is inadequate for cafeteria, arts, general classrooms and athletic fields
- NHS lacks adequate performance areas for music and drama
- All elementary schools are at or above enrollment capacity
- Elementary school population is projected to increase by an additional 462 students by 2010
- Eight portable classrooms are in use for elementary programs
- Alternative education programs are temporarily housed in a doublewide portable

Newberg Students Making Their Mark

- Class of 2001 included 11 Oregon Scholars and 36 Honors Diploma recipients
- Class of 2001 earned over \$1.6 million in scholarships
- Over 300 NHS students earned 1,197 college credits while taking classes at Newberg High School
- NHS Robotics Team earned the prestigious Judge's Choice award for its robot "Jack" from the National Society of Manufacturing Engineers
- NHS DECA chapter was named Oregon DECA Chapter of the Year
- 51 new members were inducted into the NHS National Honor Society
- Baseball, Cross Country and Boys Track teams won PAC-9 league championships



PERCENT OF STUDENTS MEET






MATHEMATICS MULTIPL




STUDENTS MEETING STANDARDS BY SUBGROUP



School Finance

We're tightening our belt.

- Newberg Schools received \$496.24 per student less than the amount received by most school districts in the state.
- The district's General Fund budget was reduced \$1.6 million over the last two years due to increased energy, salary and insurance costs.
- A Local Option Levy to reduce class size won approval by voters in May 2001, but failed to the required 50 percent majority turnout by 2.7 percent.

Grants, donations and volunteers help the bottom line

- Newberg received \$1,522,955 in state and federal grants in 2001.
- School supporters donated \$97,368 last year to enrich learning experiences.
- Volunteers donated 48,364 hours of their time to read, tutor or mentor students and help classroom teachers.
