## **School Report Card Shows High School Achievement On The Rise**

Tenth grade math and reading test scores have increased significantly. Graduation requirements are increasing. Newberg High School is one of the first Oregon high schools selected to receive a \$1.1 million grant to increase student achievement and graduation rates by developing small schools.

This is just part of the picture of efforts teachers and staff members in Newberg Public Schools are making to provide a quality education for every student.

The Newberg School District Annual Report is a snapshot of student achievement in our community. It shows state and federal data required by the No Child Left Behind Act and the Oregon Report Card. This information is intended as a starting point for discussion about where improvement might be needed and for celebrating our success.

Our report includes information about student performance on state assessments for grades three, five, eight and ten. These assessments were completed in the spring of 2004. The report also highlights staff and student achievement and financial and demographic trends. The status of district construction projects, funded by the 2002 capital improvement bond, details progress in accommodating enrollment growth, maintaining school facilities and improving safety and security. With your support, district students and staff enjoy some of the finest educational facilities in the state.



#### **School Finance**

## Our focus is on teaching and learning.

Ninety-six cents of every dollar spent on general operations in Newberg schools is used for teachers, classroom support and for transporting, housing and equipping students. Four cents of every dollar is used for central support functions such as hiring staff, preparing payroll, federal compliance, record keeping and contingency funds for emergency.
