

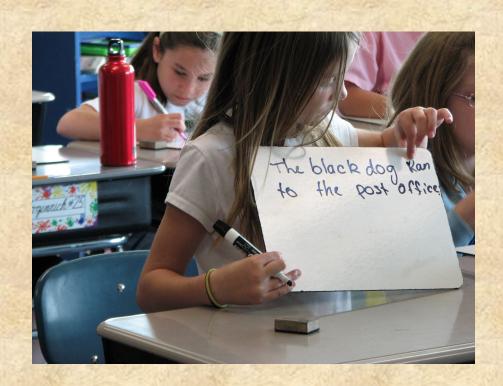

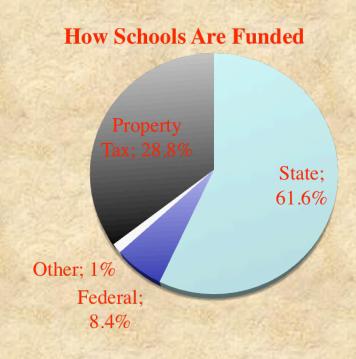

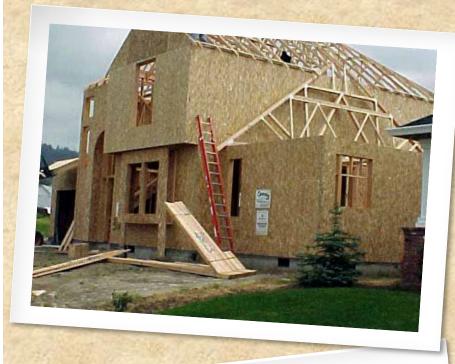
### How Oregon Schools are Funded

#### Personal Income Tax

When unemployment is high, income taxes are reduced, impacting the state General Fund and K-12 education





# Property Tax

The state reduces its funding to local schools as property values and tax collections increase



# Lottery Funds

An estimated 9% of the state's General Fund comes from state lottery funds



#### Rainy Day Fund

This fund is nearly depleted and is reliant on an ending fund balance in the state's General Fund \$46 million

# Education Stability Fund



This fund received lottery funds but is "tapped out"

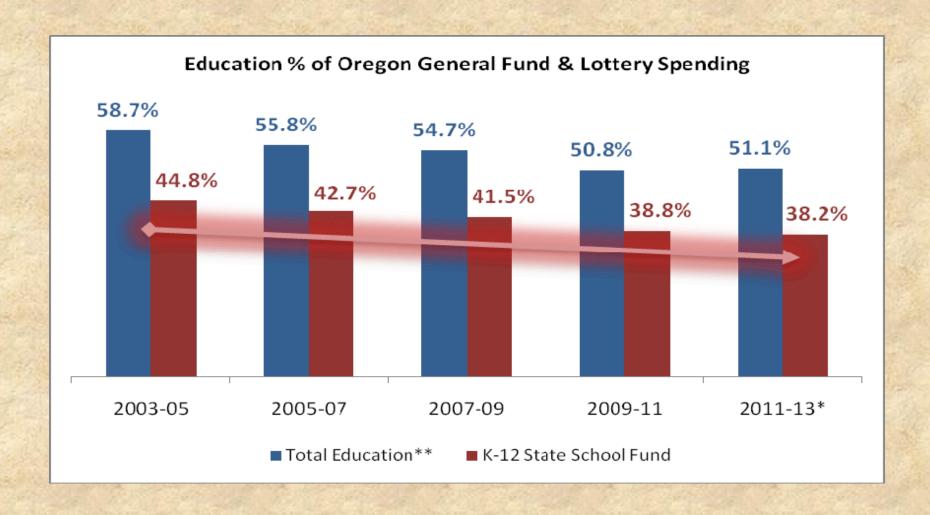

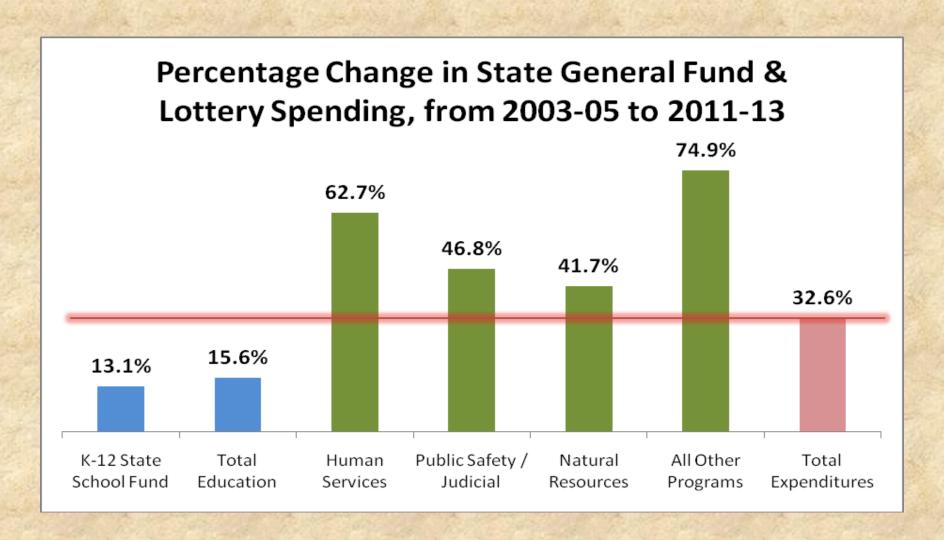

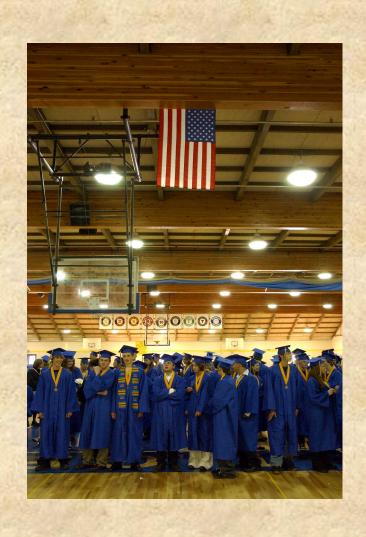

#### Achievement Compact Advisory Committee

- Responsible for developing and implementation of compact
  - Submitted by July 1<sup>st</sup> to OEIB

- Board appoints
  - Teachers, Administrators and Other Education Personnel Employed by Board



#### Achievement Compact Advisory Committee

#### Duties

- Develop plans for achieving outcomes
- Assessment and reporting progress
- Recommendations for subsequent fiscal year to Board by February 1<sup>st</sup>
- Report filed with OEIB



# Improving Instruction & Increasing Student Achievement: What Needs To Be In Place

- Specific learning standards for each grade level
  - Priority Standards
  - Concepts and Skills Clearly Identified
  - Assessments based upon (created or correlated to) Priority Standards
- Effective Instructional Strategies and Interventions are used by all teachers
  - Research-based



# Improving Instruction & Increasing Student Achievement: What Needs To Be In Place

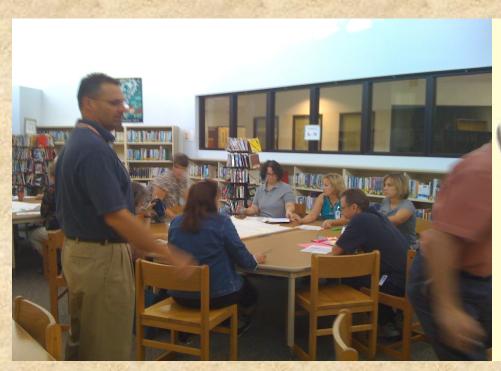
- Data-Driven Decision Making
  - Consistently used at the district, building, and classroom level
  - Structured, collaborative
  - Formative, Interim, Summative, and Performance Assessments or Tasks analyzed by teacher collaboration teams to improve instruction & increase achievement
  - Teacher collaborative teams collect and analyze adult data to improve instruction & increase student achievement
- · Creation of a Safe and Orderly Atmosphere
  - PBIS for most of the state

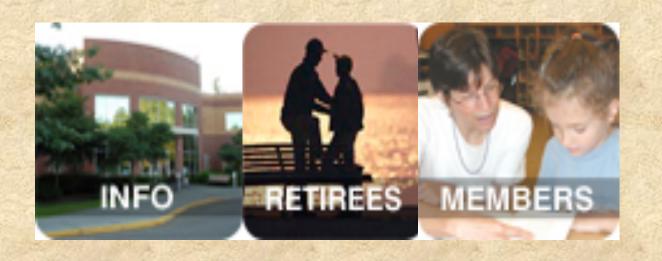

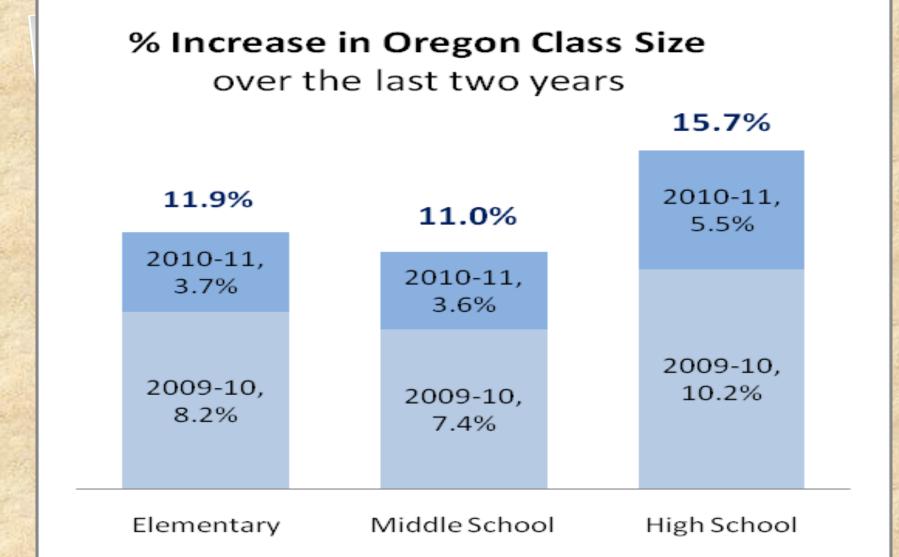
Class Size Increase

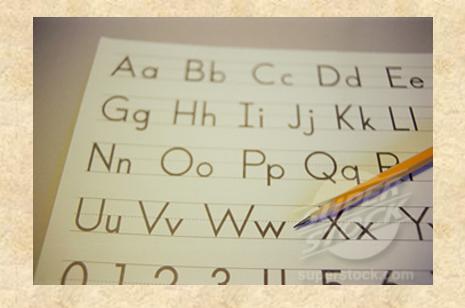
