#### FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents and Community Members,

In the 2015-2016 school year, Mountain View students met or exceeded the state average scores in both English/Language Arts and Science, but failed to stay even with other schools in Math on the new Smarter Balanced assessment. This was the second year that students have been measured using the new assessment, which is more focused on critical thinking than the previously used OAKS assessments. School improvement efforts this year will focus on math and on closing the achievement gaps for some of our different populations.

We are building supports for students who are not meeting benchmark goals. This year, we have reading interventions for students who are shown to be reading below grade level. We also have targeted study hall times for students who are academically struggling. Finally, all teachers are being trained in and expected to utilize teaching strategies which are designed to meet the needs of all students in the classroom.

We want every student to be successful at MVMS, and are working to set up systems to help in that goal.

Finally, the involvement of our families and community is paramount to the success of our students. We are very fortunate to have an active group of parents and families supporting our students and their successes, and we are always looking to involve more parents. We know the support students receive at home is critical to their accomplishments at Mountain View and our collaboration with parents and families is very important to us. We welcome comments and suggestions, and look forward to the continued involvement of our families.



# SCHOOL READINESS

The middle school years are the time when students begin to learn who they are as people and as students. At Mountain View, we know we play a vital role in this development. We support students in a variety of ways, but we are most proud of our "Super Star Rewards" student incentive system. We use the system to reward

positive behaviors in targeted areas and have found it is very effective in helping students understand their actions and the possible consequences of those actions. These are lessons that we are hopeful students will take with them to high school and life after school.

### ACADEMIC SUPPORT

Every student at Mountain View is enrolled in a rigorous core curriculum including humanities, math, science, and physical education. Teachers differentiate curriculum for all students in order to ensure that all students can access the curriculum in a way that allows them to be successful. Supports are place to help those students who may be struggling. Interventions are in place to support those students who may need extra instruction in math and reading.

### ACADEMIC ENRICHMENT

In addition to our core classes, Mountain View has a variety of electives available to students, including instrumental and vocal music as well as a full schedule of art courses. We have added new electives in cooking and Spanish language in the 2016-17 school year.

# CAREER & TECHNICAL EDUCATION

Mountain View is committed to offering students a wide variety of opportunities to explore STEM (science, technology, engineering, and math). We have been able to expand our elective offerings in the CTE area this year to include courses in woodshop, Lego Robotics, and 3D printing.
