#### Counselor's Corner

#### Yes, Again

It seems each year I am compelled to write about the impact of media on our children. Please, do not stop reading now. You may think you have heard it all before. You may think that your child is different and this doesn't apply. You may think your child can handle it. But please, do not stop reading this. With the exception of severe injury or illness, the brains of all our children work pretty much the same. This means the research applies to us all.

The following information comes from a panel discussion on 11/14/2011 with researchers from the New York University Child Study Center. Here is their partial response to how media affects a child's development:

Because texting, instant messaging, and social networking sites like Facebook are still comparatively new, research is not really available yet on their long-term effects. But we can extrapolate a certain amount from research on the effects of TV and video games on children's development.

Among preschoolers, more time spent watching TV has been shown to have a negative impact on attention, academic performance, and adjustment in elementary school and middle school.

Increases in media use are associated with reduced grades; only 23 percent of "light" users averaged C's or worse, as compared with 47 percent of "heavy" users.

Kids who see more TV learn to read later and slower. Violent and sexual content, in both TV and video games, bring their own concerns. Increased exposure to violence has been proven to result in:

- More aggressive behavior
- More aggressive thoughts
- More angry feelings
- Increases in fear

· Fewer helping behaviors

Less empathy

While not as scientific, please know that I see these influences at school. The technology is not all bad. There are some amazing benefits to the advances we see. Our children simply need us to help them understand the idea of balance and self control in accessing this amazing source. Next month I will provide more information from this panel and highlight what they see parents needing to do. So, please, don't stop reading.
