Old King Cole was a merry old soul and a merry old soul was he. He called for his pipe and he called for his bowl and threw them out ...(to Refrain)






There was an old woman who lived in a shoe. She had so many children, she didn't know what to do. She gave them some broth without any bread, and threw it out ...(to Refrain)
