Pacific Crab Apple Malus fusca	36'	A-B	Moist soils near wetlands	2a	Native apple with fragrant blossoms producing small green to red fruit. Red and yellow fall color.
Pacific Ninebark Physocarpus capitatus	10'	A-C	Moist soils along wetlands	2a	Large spreading, attractive shrub with rounded clusters of white flowers. Maple like leaves, thin shredded bark.
Red Flowering Currant Ribes sanguineum	10'	A-B	Best on well drained soils	1, 2a, 2b	Beautiful ornamental shrub with white, pink, to deep red flowers that attracts butterflies and hummingbirds.
Red Osier Dogwood Cornus sericea	15'	A-C	Moist soils along wetlands	1, 2a, 2b, 3, 4	Attractive red stems with white flower cluster that produces white berry clusters. Fast growing.

Snowberry Symphoricarpos albus	6'	A-B	Grows on dry to moist sites	1, 2a, 2b	Adaptable shrub having attractive foliage and clusters of waxy white berries that persist through winter.
Western Spirea Spiraea douglasii	3-6'	A-B	Wet to moist soils	1	Erect leggy shrub producing pinkish purple flower blooms during July. Attractive ornamental. Great for pollinators.

### OTHER PLANTS AND PRODUCTS AVAILABLE

I NODUCIO AVAILADEL
Fern like perennial (1' to 2' tall) with pinkish-purple heart shaped flowers forming 5 to 15 in. clusters.
Prefers moist, shady conditions in forests or along streams or among other garden plants.
Also known as Early Blue Violet. Low growing evergreen perennial (to 4") that grows well in a wide
range of conditions from dry rock gardens to moist forest under story sites. Flowers very early.
Wild strawberry grows in a variety of habitats. Low growing attractive foliage and white flowers provide
a nice groundcover with small, sweet berries. A plus if you can get them before the birds.
Low growing perennial (3 to 5" high) produces abundant pink to lavender blooms and forms dense
patches. Good for rock gardens and landscape beds.
Perennial growing 1" to 2" tall. Beautiful hairy, heart shaped leaves give way to slender stalks of fragrant
greenish white flowers. Grows naturally in moist forests or along stream banks with some shade.
Perennial herb that resembles commercial iris varieties. Grows in clumps with purple to blue flowers.
Foliage makes a nice border. Tolerates a range of soil conditions.
Perennial growing 1 to 2" tall that produces gorgeous yellow flowers and attractive woolly foliage. Grows
naturally in open dry habitats such as rocky slopes but tolerates being planted in landscape beds.
The only native blackberry also called Trailing Blackberry or Dewberry. Has slender trailing vines
bearing delicious late summer fruit. Not to be confused with non-native, invasive blackberry species.
Erect perennial herb (to 3') with soft foliage and ornate drooping red to yellow flowers. Likes moist, open
to partially shaded sites in the forest or in flower beds.
Evergreen perennial with attractive heart shaped leaves that give a strong lemon-ginger smell when
crushed. Good foliage plant for landscape beds.
Expandable netting easily stretches around seedlings to protect vulnerable buds. Photo-degrades after
approx. 2 years. No staking required. Sold in 25 foot lengths that can be cut to fit individual seedlings.
